Andouille Fete Revelers Riot; Six Arrested

LA PLACE, La.—Six persons were arrested Sunday night after firemen were called in to break up a disturbance with fire hoses when a crowd of about 100 people refused to leave the LaPlace Andouille Festival Fair Grounds after being told that the festival was officially over.

St. John Parish Sheriff's Office Information Officer Edward Rome said that one deputy, Ronald Davis, received minor injuries.

Rome said that about 100 persons gathered around the beer stands and were told several times to leave the fair grounds when the crowds began shouting obscenities to deputies demanding that the beer stands remain open. Deputies continued requesting the crowd to leave when beer bottles and other objects began to shower deputies.

LaPlace firemen were then called in with fire hoses to disperse the crowd which then dwindled to about 25 when the arrests were made by deputies.

Arrested were: Patrick Burns, 17, of LaPlace; Blane Garrick, 18, of LaPlace; Paul Harris Jr., 18, of LaPlace; Brian Legendre, 17, of LaPlace; Francis LaBranche, 18, of LaPlace; and Luccio Palmissano, 17, of Destrehan.

Rome said that the windshield of a unit was broken by a brick thrown during the riot and that in an apparently

related incident, a picture window at the residence of Sheriff Lloyd Johnson was broken.

Robert Brennan, President of the LaPlace Andouille Festival, said Monday that gross receipts from the festival indicates that over \$113,000 was made during the three-day festival and that approximately 100,000 persons attended.

Neighbors Having a Tiff with Fair Grounds Corp.

Peaceful coexistence between the Fair Grounds and the residents of the neighborhood it occupies seems jeopardized for the moment.

Spokesmen for both the Faubourg St. John Neighborhood Association and the Coalition for Action, which includes about a dozen neighborhood groups with Faubourg St. John among them, held a press conference at the edge of the race track Monday, protesting alleged actions and inactions of the Fair Grounds Corp.

Cullen Landry, vice president of Faubourg St. John, represented it, and Russell Caril, president of the coalition, spoke for his organization.

Landry listed three separate issues on which the neighborhood people are at odds with the corporation.

But Arthur Steiner, the Fair Grounds Corp.'s treasurer and attorney, said, in effect, in response, that the corporation is dealing with each issue.

Landry's first complaint was that the corporation had started to build, without a city permit, a wall-like structure behind the home of an association member, Larry Acosta of 3119 Fortin St.

And, he said, the firm did not cease work on it, when a stop work order was issued by the City's Safety and Permits Department. Harold J. Gorman, head of the department, confirmed that his agency did issue the stop work order, because of the lack of a permit.

Steiner, though, said, "We have honored the stop work order."

The second issue Landry raised was that the corporation had not built a turn-around in the northwest section of Belfort Street. The street was closed to the public at this point, in a land swap between the city

and the corporation in 1977, he said, but the firm agreed in the swap to build the turn-around.

Steiner commented on this. "We just don't have the labor to build the turn-around now, but we're putting up bond with the city this week, guaranteeing that we will construct it."

Landry's third complaint was that the corporation had gone ahead with building a horse barn on city property, specifically the Romulus Street right-of-way, and had no right to do so.

Steiner said the corporation was in the process of buying the land and didn't know the status of the barn, which Landry said was well under way. Landry also said the corporation had obtained a city permit to build the barn. Gorman said he didn't know whether the city has issued the permit or not, but was researching the issue Monday.

In related comment, Joanne Belcich, an administrative assistant to City Councilman Mike Early, said that Early had introduced an ordinance that had not been voted on yet in which the city would get some North White Street property from the Fair Grounds Corp., giving the corporation, in exchange, the Romulus Street property in question.

But, she said, Early has held over the ordinance each week, at the request of the City Planning Commission. The CPC wants some assurance that the Belfort Street turn-around will be built, before it gives the go-ahead on the swap proposal, she said.
